RE: Confidential Request to Seal Records - USA v. Darren Chaker

Dear Judge [REDACTED],

It has been weeks since I appeared before you briefly, as did my sister who clerked for Judge [REDACTED]. You had asked me during the 9/5/13 hearing, if CJA Attorney [REDACTED] had represented me well and prior to answering [REDACTED] interjected.

Attorney [REDACTED] did not do what he said he was going to do in that he was going to seal the Warrant and Docket entries disclosing my sealed name. Allow me to outline a few pressing reasons to have the court order such now or to appoint counsel to do so.

Specifically, prior to surrendering in April 2012, I had a third party produce voluminous records at my request to AUSA [REDACTED] and two FBI special agents. The records concerned a Homeland Security Special Agent named [REDACTED] who previously worked in San Diego and now works in Los Angeles, but lives in [REDACTED]. Records provided indicated [REDACTED] has a UBS account in Zurich with ample funds, failed to disclose his UBS account on his tax returns (also provided), had a sexual relationship with a named CI, fraudulently obtained a HUD loan through the Officer Next Door Program when in fact he did not qualify due to already owning a home in [REDACTED], taking money from Russian Organized crime on video, and disclosing the location of two material witnesses who were later killed before testify in court.

The above information is relevant since until entered into WITSEC a sealed name was obtained and is now part of the public record. Having this information a public record not only endangers my life but also violates my right to privacy in sealed records. See, Gonzalez v. Spencer, 336 F.3d 832 (privacy in case name, case number and contents of file). I would ask the court seal:

1. The warrant for arrest - this record remains sealed in the Southern District of Texas; it is important to seal the record since it discloses the sealed name which DSS was responsible for obtaining a passport while assisted through my attorney, [REDACTED].
2. Docket Entry 6 which discloses the sealed name.
3. The transcript for the 9/5/13 hearing which the sealed name was disclosed.

I ask the court to provide a copy of this letter to AUSA [REDACTED], as I do not have access to a copier. My bond hearing continues to be delayed as I have written the court to produce [REDACTED] since his past threats prompted me in part to obtain a sealed name change, and the fact I retain his old laptop computer is a concern to him.
